
"Dang, did we do something wrong?" Sakari asked.

Acts 16:11-15, 40; 1 Corinthians 1:26-30

11 From Troas we put out to sea and sailed straight for Samothrace, and the next day we went on to Neapolis. 12 From there we traveled to Philippi, a Roman colony and the leading city of that district of Macedonia. And we stayed there several days. 13 On the Sabbath we went outside the city gate to the river, where we expected to find a place of prayer. We sat down and began to speak to the women who had gathered there. 14 One of those listening was a woman from the city of Thyatira named Lydia, a dealer in purple cloth. She was a worshiper of God. The Lord opened her heart to respond to Paul's message. 15 When she and the members of her household were baptized, she invited us to her home. "If you consider me a believer in the Lord," she said, "come and stay at my house." And she persuaded us.

40 After Paul and Silas came out of the prison, they went to Lydia's house, where they met with the brothers and sisters and encouraged them. Then they left.

26 Brothers and sisters, think of what you were when you were called. Not many of you were wise by human standards; not many were influential; not many were of noble birth. 27 But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong. 28 God chose the lowly things of this world and the despised things—and the things that are not—to nullify the things that are, 29 so that no one may boast before him. 30 It is because of him that you are in Christ Jesus, who has become for us wisdom from God—that is, our righteousness, holiness and redemption.

Intersect

Today's lesson focuses on Lydia, another woman who was an avid supporter of Paul's ministry. Lydia came from a place called Thyatira, which was well-known for its textile industry, especially purple dyes. By profession, Lydia was a dealer of purple cloth. During ancient times, the buyers of purple cloth were usually rich and royal people in the Roman world. As a seller of purple cloth, Lydia was connected to some of the most prestigious and wealthy people in the land. Lydia was both a businesswoman and a homeowner, which was extremely rare in the days of the early church.

Paul met Lydia during his mission trip to Philippi, which was an area near eastern Macedonia. After being in Philippi for several days, Paul wanted to find a place in which to pray and worship. There was no synagogue in the town, so he went down to the river where the God-fearing women were gathered. As Paul was speaking to the women, Lydia was listening. Lydia was already a believer and a worshipper of God. When she heard Paul's message about Jesus Christ, converted. Lydia and the others in her household were baptized, making a public confession of their new life in Jesus Christ. After being converted, Lydia was moved to connect with Paul and others of the faith. She opened her home to Paul and others in his ministry and convinced them to stay while they ministered in Philippi.

Inside Out

Lydia believed in God, but she did not know about the Gospel of Jesus Christ. When Paul ministered to Lydia and others who had gathered at the river, their spirits agreed. Paul did not have to convince Lydia about the ways of Jesus because her spirit was already primed to receive the Good News message due to her devotion to God. This story reminds believers that our job is to simply share the message of Jesus with others and allow Him to bring the increase according to His divine plan.



There's an App for That!

Youth often believe that sharing the Gospel is only a requirement for adults. God desires for youth to surrender their lives to Him at an early age, so they have many years to help Him build the kingdom. Today, so many youths do not have a relationship with Jesus. Just think about how many young souls could be won for Christ if young believers opened their mouths and shared the Good News with their friends, neighbors, and youth in the community. Never underestimate your level of influence. Say "yes" to God and allow Him to empower you to serve your generation.


Kevin Elijah Burgess
