

God's Word

29 "In those days people will no longer say, 'The parents have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge.' 30 Instead, everyone will die for their own sin; whoever eats sour grapes—their own teeth will be set on edge. 31 The days are coming," declares the Lord, "when I will make a new covenant with the people of Israel and with the people of Judah. 32 It will not be like the covenant I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to lead them out of Egypt, because they broke my covenant, though I was a husband to them," declares the Lord. 33 "This is the covenant I will make with the people of Israel after that time," declares the Lord. "I will put my law in their minds and write it on their hearts. I will be their God, and they will be my people. 34 No longer will they teach their neighbor, or say to one another, 'Know the Lord,' because they will all know me, from the least of them to the greatest," declares the Lord. "For I will forgive their wickedness and will remember their sins no more."

Bible Story

You Have No Excuse!

Jeremiah 31:29-34; John 1:17

The Lord gave Jeremiah a message of hope for the people of Israel and Judah. In the message, Jeremiah told the people that the day would come when they would no longer say, "The parents have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge (or pucker because of the sour taste)." This means that the children would no longer have to pay for their parents' sins. Instead, everyone would be responsible for and face the consequences of his or her own sins.

The Lord declared that the days were coming when He would make a new covenant (or agreement) with the people of Israel and Judah. This new covenant would not be like the covenant that He gave through Moses and made with their ancestors when the Lord led them out of Egypt. They broke that covenant, although the Lord loved them the way a husband loves his wife.

The Lord said that He would put His law in the people's minds and write it on their hearts. He would be their God, and they would be His people. The people would no longer say to each other, "Know the Lord," because they would all know the Lord. Everyone, from the least of them to the greatest, would know the Lord. Because of truth and grace through Jesus, the Lord would forgive and no longer remember their sins.
